
**TODAY'S CHALLENGE** 

A child's identity credentials are particularly valuable to identity thieves, because their use can go undetected for years.



## CHILD IDENTITY THEFT BY THE NUMBERS

In 2017 > 1 Million children fell victim to identity theft.1

## **ENDANGER CHILD IDENTITY**

Such breaches give fraudsters access to personally identifiable information (PII) like Social Security numbers, birth-dates, phone numbers and addresses, health insurance and Medicaid information, and more – all sensitive data that can help crooks steal identities.<sup>2</sup>

The commoditization of stolen data on the dark web makes it easier than ever for criminals to steal identities.2



## SAFEGUARDING CHILD IDENTITY

SECURE YOUR CHILD'S CREDIT



Notices from the IRS or credit card companies bearing your child's name could indicate identity theft.

### **Don't Delay**

Act immediately if you see something suspicious.

### Are your family's sensitive documents secured?

TAKE EXTRA PRECAUTIONS

Consider a bank box or fireproof, locked safe at home.

#### Is a Social Security number required or optional?

If a form requests a SSN, don't be afraid to ask. Refrain from divulging SSNs unnecessarily.

#### Have you had "the talk"?

Have routine, age-appropriate conversations with your kids about what it means to share info online and in-person - and why it's best to keep it private.
